About the Program

Art is a space that allows us to reflect on our place in the world and reenchant, reimagine, or even revolutionise the way we exist in it. The exhibitions in the IMA's 2023 program each offer us an opportunity to examine the systems we live in, assess what is not serving our community, and to contemplate the alternative structures that we might need to build to take with us into the future.

We open the year with a partnership presentation with the **Biennale of Sydney**, *Maluw Adhil Urngu Padanu Mamuy Moesik (Legends from the deep sitting peacefully on the waters)*. Taking its title from our co-commission with the **Torres Strait 8**, this exhibition brings together exciting International and Australian artists whose works look at the powerful knowledges that live within our natural world. Shifting our perspective can shift our actions.

Into the middle of the year **Raphaela Rosella** will present her powerful collaborative exhibition that explores emotional contours of interactions with the Prison Industrial Complex. Created in dialogue with her family and community, *You'll Know It When You Feel It* uses video and photography to document their experiences, and makes a powerful comment on the bureaucratic violence imbued through the carceral system.

Alongside this **'the churchie'** will return for its fifth iteration at the IMA, presenting vibrant and varied works from emerging artists across the country. Always insightful and experimental this long-running exhibition offers an opportunity to see exciting new artistic voices and the best of emerging visual arts practice, curated by a leading emerging practitioner.

To close the year **Daniel Boyd** will present his ambitiously scaled *Rainbow Serpent* (*version*), an immersive exhibition extending across the IMA galleries. Boyd will stretch his distinctive motif across the IMA spaces and share an ambitious program of live activations from thinkers, makers, and performers that interrogate Eurocentric histories.

We will also embrace a new partnership with **NOWNESS Asia** commissioning five Australian artists to create new video works in a series curated by **Kate ten Buuren**. *Now You're Speakin' My Language* will reflect on the power of communication as a means to close distance and will present these works to online audiences across the region.

Accompanying each presentation will be a rich supporting program of events with *Final Fridays* and *MONO* returning in 2023. We look forward to sharing our program with you across the year. Join us for art that asks pertinent questions and demands urgent answers.

The IMA has collaborated with the **Biennale of Sydney** to commission a new work from the **Torres Strait 8**, a collective on the frontlines of advocacy for the climate crisis in Zenadh Kes (the Torres Strait Islands and surrounding seas). Led by **Yessie Mosby**, a Kulkalgal Traditional Owner and member of the group, Torres Strait 8 present a hybrid art-as-protest piece featuring campaign materials created as part of the *Our Islands Our Home* campaign. Yessie Mosby and the Torres Strait 8's participation in the Biennale and IMA project will continue to magnify the campaign fighting for justice for the communities of Zenadh Kes in holding the Australian Government accountable on climate change policy.

This commission will form the anchor for a broader curation of select works from the 23rd Biennale of Sydney: rīvus that speak to our enduring connections and responsibilities to the natural world. Through the exhibited work, Maluw Adhil Urngu Padanu Mamuy Moesik (Legends from the deep sitting peacefully on the waters) will explore how these potential relationships might decentre the human, prioritise care for Country, and pursue justice in an epoch of rising temperatures and seas.

This partnership is part of the *Casiquiare | Biennale of Sydney* new national collaboration project, which involves collaborating with leading cultural institutions across Australia, presenting co-commissioned artworks in the Biennale of Sydney and, separately, in unique curated shows at institutions across Australia.

Raphaela Rosella: You'll Know It When You Feel It

ARTISTS

In Australia and across the globe demands are growing for a society in which prisons and policing are no longer the default solution to address social, economic, and political issues in our communities. Despite this, systems of surveillance, classification, and control extend far beyond prison walls, parole boards and courtrooms. They are embedded in archives, bureaucratic procedures, and the subsequent documents that record an individual's lived experience. Unveiling the ineptitude of 'official records', *You'll Know It When You Feel It* is a socially engaged art project that seeks to resist bureaucratic representations of women whose lives intersect with the Prison Industrial Complex (PIC).

Co-created by Brisbane based artist **Raphaela Rosella**, this intimate work has emerged over fifteen years alongside several women in her life. From six-minute phone calls to handwritten letters that circulate between Rosella, her friends, family members and loved ones, the multi-authored exhibition *You'll Know It When You Feel It* examines the value of their co-created archive as a site of resistance.

Presented in partnership with advocacy organisation **Sisters Inside**, *You'll Know It When You Feel It* will be accompanied by a series of community-engaged programs featuring performances, panel discussions, artist talks, and creative workshops. Led by contemporary Meriam/Munbarra artist and prison abolitionist **Boneta-Marie Mabo**, the program will provide a platform for criminalised and formerly incarcerated individuals, artists, activists, and scholars to challenge how art can resist the carceral state.

the churchie emerging art prize

the churchie emerging art prize has provided a platform to profile the next generation of contemporary artists from across Australia since its inception in 1987 at Anglican Church Grammar School. In 2023 the IMA will present the 35th edition of the prize, marking the fifth presentation partnership between the two organisations. Finalists are selected via an open call, which is assessed by leading national curators and artists. The selected finalists will be supported through professional curatorial advice, networking, practice development, and promotion, to present their best work on both a local and national stage. Thanks to generous supporters, 'the churchie' offers a prize pool of \$25,000, with the overall winner receiving a non-acquisitive \$15,000 cash prize donated by long-standing sponsor, **BSPN Architecture**.

Daniel Boyd: Rainbow Serpent (version)

Curated by Liz Nowell

Daniel Boyd has achieved international acclaim for his infinite and dynamic universes, which reframe and reflect the darker side of Australian history. *Rainbow Serpent (version)* is the first major presentation of the artist's work in Brisbane, and features an ambitious new commission developed in partnership with **Gropius Bau**, Berlin.

Across site-specific installation, participatory programs and painting, *Rainbow Serpent* (*version*) contends with the legacy of imperialism in our built environment, civic spaces and architectural monuments. Rendered in Boyd's distinctive circular motif, the IMA gallery floors will be transformed into a stage-like mirrored surface, activated by scholars, artists, community groups and activists throughout the duration of the exhibition. Presented alongside recent paintings and research material, *Rainbow Serpent (version)* continues Boyd's longstanding interrogation of Eurocentric histories, inviting us to reconsider the spaces and places we inhabit.

Now You're Speakin' My Language is a new digital commissioning partnership between IMA and **NOWNESS Asia**. It will present five new films by artists that consider memory, language and place through their work. Taungurung artist and curator **Kate ten Buuren** will commission five artists of Australian First Nations, Southeast Asian and Asia Pacific backgrounds/diasporas, to create new video works that reflect on the ways that language and story connect us across oceans, rivers, lands, and imposed borders, as well as across time.

The commissions will premiere on NOWNESS Asia, a global film platform presenting the best of arts and culture in Asia to audiences across the region. This project will introduce the work of five Australia-based video artists to a global audience engaged with film, culture, and contemporary art, and profile the strength and innovative practices of contemporary artists in Australia.

Gordon Hookey: A MURRIALITY

Curated by José Da Silva and Liz Nowell

A MURRIALITY is the first survey of renowned Waanyi artist **Gordon Hookey**, charting three decades of practice where artmaking and activism fuse.

Hookey's work is best known for its biting satire of Australian culture and politics, its witty critique of racism, and an exploration of oral and image-based history-making traditions. Across sculpture, printmaking, video, and large-scale painting, *A MURRIALITY* presents perspectives on historical and contemporary issues affecting Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. Through the lens of Hookey's lived experience as a Murri person, this includes legal injustices, international conflict, cultural representations, and language.

The exhibition features a significant new commission that draws inspiration from Hookey's vast collection of political posters and continues his acclaimed series of protest banners. Made for use in the public realm at Invasion Day marches and rallies recognising Aboriginal resistance fighter Dundalli, Hookey's banners provide timely socio-political commentary while also imagining a truly empowered Indigenous future.

Natalya Hughes: The Interior

Curated by Tulleah Pearce

Can we use the talking cure to solve society's 'problem' with women? Natalya Hughes' *The Interior* invites audiences into an exaggerated consultation room playfully furnished for psychoanalysis. This immersive installation combines sculptural seating, richly patterned soft furnishings, and uncanny objet d'art, nestled around a hand-painted mural to generate a stimulating space to unpack our collective and unconscious biases.

Interested in the role of women and their historical absence from positions of power, the part-professional part-domestic setting conjured by *The Interior* plays with gendered power dynamics between public and private space. The couches that dot the gallery take their lush contours from the shapes of the female body, and their detailed upholstery sees motifs of eyes, rats, and snakes from Freud's patient case studies ripple over the space in fleshy tones.

Audiences are invited to recline and be enveloped, soothed, and held by the furniture's womanly forms while taking turns playing analyst and patient. Throughout this bodily encounter *The Interior* hopes to create a space where the existence of women can be reimagined on different terms in the 'post-Me Too' world.
