Speaker Biographies What Can Art Institutions Do?

Peter Anderson works as an independent practitioner in the fields of writing and the visual arts, and has published numerous essays on the history of the IMA and artist-run practice in Brisbane. He is curating *ephemeral traces: Brisbane's artist-run scene in the 1980s* for the University of Queensland Art Museum (2016).

Sean Dockray is a Melbourne-based artist, PhD candidate at the Victorian College of the Arts, founding director of Telic Arts Exchange in Los Angeles and initiator of the autonomous, self-organized pedagogical projects The Public School and AAAARG.ORG.

Helen Hughes is co-founder and co-editor of the contemporary art journal Discipline (with Nicholas Croggon and David Homewood), and an editor of the peer-reviewed online journal emaj—Electronic Melbourne Art Journal. She is currently a curator at Gertrude Contemporary in Melbourne.

Professor Callum Morton is an artist based in Melbourne, and the Practice Professor in Fine Art at Monash Art Design and Architecture in Melbourne. In addition to numerous international exhibitions and major public commissions, in 2007 Morton was one of three artists to represent Australia at the Venice Biennale.

Maud Page is Deputy Director, Collection and Exhibitions at the Queensland Art Gallery I Gallery of Modern Art, where she is directly responsible for the management and development of the Gallery's collections and exhibitions. She has been instrumental in the realisation of major exhibitions and projects, including the Asia Pacific Triennial (APT7 & APT8).

Professor Nikos Papastergiadis is Director, Research Unit in Public Cultures and Professor, School of Culture and Communication at the University of Melbourne. His recent publications include *Spatial Aesthetics: Art Place and the Everyday* (2006), *Cosmopolitanism and Culture* (2012), *Ambient Perspectives* (2013).

Dr Courtney Pedersen is the Head of Discipline for Visual Arts and a Senior Lecturer in Art History / Theory at QUT, as well as an artist, writer and co-director of the feminist artist collective LEVEL. Her research explores gender, creative practice-led research, histories of the local, and visual arts pedagogy.

Raqs Media Collective was founded in 1992 by Jeebesh Bagchi, Monica Narula and Shuddhabrata Sengupta, in New Delhi, India, with outputs across film, installation, research and events. They enjoy playing a plurality of roles, often appearing as artists, occasionally as curators, sometimes as philosophical agent provocateurs.

Professor Terry Smith is Andrew W. Mellon Professor of Contemporary Art History and Theory in the Department of the History of Art and Architecture at the University of Pittsburgh. He is the author of a number of books, most recently *What is Contemporary Art?* (2009), *Contemporary Art: World Currents* (2011), and *Thinking Contemporary Curating* (2012).

Dr Ann Stephen is Senior Curator, University Art Gallery, University of Sydney, and current chair of Art Monthly Australia. Her books include *On looking at looking: The art and politics of Ian Burn* (2006); *Modernism & Australia* (2006) and *Modern Times* (2008) both co-edited with Andrew McNamara and Philip Goad.
